

SUMMER OPPORTUNITIES

COLLEGE PROGRAMS

- ↪ Colleges around the country offer a plethora of summer programs for high school students. Some focus on developing academic skills or a particular skill such as creative writing. Others offer introductory programs in architecture or engineering, for example. Many grant college credit to participants. Residential programs generally include sight-seeing and recreational outings in addition to academic enrichment. Financial aid is usually *not* available for these programs, except for those that focus on the needs of educationally or economically disadvantaged youth, such as EOP and EAOP programs.
- ↪ Diablo Valley College EOP offers a *Summer Institute* for high school students and new graduates. This intensive six week college readiness program focuses on college English and math skills, and includes field trips to four-year colleges in the area. *Educational Opportunity Programs* at University of California campuses offers summer residential academies giving students an opportunity to experience campus life, enhance study skills, prepare for college, and study in-depth a variety of subject areas. - ↪ The *California State Summer School for the Arts* is a four-week residential program offered at the California Institute of the Arts in Valencia. REGIONAL OCCUPATION PROGRAM (ROP)

- ↪ The county sponsored ROP program, which provides training in marketable job skills, typically offers one or two summer courses for high school students. Students must be sixteen years of age, or have completed tenth grade, to enroll in an ROP class. Contact the ROP registrar at 942-3437, or visit: www.cocoschools.org.

COMMUNITY SERVICE AND INTERNSHIPS

- ↪ Summer employment opportunities include paid and unpaid internships for the purposes of career exploration and development of job skills. Students with little time to pursue community service during the school year may want to consider a residential or local community service opportunity during the summer. Consult the *Summer Opportunities Bulletin*, MDUSD Summer Programs brochure, High School Daily Announcements, Scholarship Bulletins, Volunteer Lists, and job board postings at your high school College & Career Center to identify appropriate opportunities. COMMUNITY COLLEGES

- A summer session is offered at Diablo Valley College and other community colleges. Classes are open to high school students on a space available basis. The DVC summer course schedule is available by early March, and can be purchased for a nominal fee at the campus book store. It is also posted on-line at www.dvc.edu. To receive high school credit, prior approval must be obtained from your high school administration. An application and school authorization form must be submitted to the community college's Office of Admission. Ninth graders are not allowed to pre-register for community college classes. A ninth grader may report to the first meeting of the class he or she is interested in taking, and seek the instructor's permission to enroll. Required forms can be obtained at the high school campus.

UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, BERKELEY

- The Academic Talent Development Program (ATDP) at U.C. Berkeley is an enrichment program for gifted students in grades seven through eleven. A wide variety of high school classes, and several Advanced Placement courses, are offered. Financial aid is available. Contact your high school *College & Career Center* in January or early February for application information, or visit the ATDP website: <http://atdp.berkeley.edu>. The course catalog and application are both available on-line.
- High school students who have completed tenth grade may enroll in U.C. Berkeley's regular, college summer session. A 3.0 grade point average and recommendation are required.
